# MANAGEMENT LETTER

As this financial year is closing, we are witnessing an unprecedented challenge to humanity in the form of the pandemic caused by COVID-19. At the time of writing this note, already over 25,65,059 have been infected worldwide with 1,77,496 dead. The race to save lives and find a cure/treatment has taken the world by storm.

Notwithstanding this terrible state, warnings for several years now from various scientific groups world over, regarding the on-going and projected deaths due to climate change is going unheeded.

In 2018, World Health Organisation (WHO) predicted predicted that between 2030 and 2050, global warming would cause an additional 250,000 deaths per year from heat stress, malnutrition, malaria and diarrhoea. All of these are exacerbated from changes in climatic conditions caused by the increase in greenhouse gases.

Rising temperatures results in higher incidence of death causing heat strokes, communicable and vector borne diseases (Nipa, Q fever, etc.); forest fires and reduced availability of water leading to changing habitats for animals, and agricultural cropping patterns pushing vulnerable communities to adapt at heavy costs.

Should we look at the COVID-19 crisis as a call to hit the reset button? Can we maybe finally see that current forms of development are causing irreversible damage to the environment and in turn, us? Or will we have short-term memory loss, and continue business-as-usual to again be affronted with another crisis sooner than later?

My guess, unfortunately is that of the latter, unless there is a systemic and massive change in the way we live and respect the environment that gives us everything. Humans are used to too much of the "good thing".

Behaviour change is a must. ENSYDE continues is mission to bring about behavioural change through providing education, and simple sustainable solutions for the environment.

We thank our supporters, donors and well-wishers who have come with us on our journey the last 4 years, and hope that you will continue being with us for years to come.

# **ACHIEVEMENTS AND AWARDS**





In 2018, ENSYDE's bE-Responsible Initiative was selected as the top 8 finalists for the Innovation Challenge for Benguluru Urban. This Challenge was a project of the Tata Center for Development at UChicago and the Urban Development Department of the Government of Karnataka.



In 2019, ENSYDE's bE-Responsible Initiative and the Experiential Environmental Education Program were selected as one of the winners of the BUILD Magazine Announces The Recycling & Waste Management Awards 2019.

# BE- RESPONSIBLE INITIATIVE

This program was extended from 30 wards to 40 wards over the period of 2018–20. The donors VMWare and Western Digital have continued their active support to the program and ENSYDE is very appreciative of their commitment to the initiatives. We conducted a Mega E-waste day in association with Western Digital at 17 locations in East and North east Bangalore apartments and residential layouts including Prestige Shantiniketan, AECS Layout, Asset Gardenia, Ferns Habitat, etc. to name a few. This was widely featured on Fever 104FM radio channel during RJ Prithvi's show. It was a successful drive which resulted in an encouraging collection of 1311 kgs!

We have also forged a successful association with the Bangalore Apartment Federation (BAF) which has a total membership of 500+ apartments in the city. We propose to work closely with BAF to sensitize and on-board these apartments to our program for scheduled collection.

bE-Responsible has successfully associated with Dunzo to service e-waste pick up from homes. Citizens may use this service to dispose small items through our program. Several citizens have already used this option for e-waste disposal.

The pilot program at Mysuru in association with Swami Vivekananda Youth Movement and Saraswatipuram Post office has been completed with around 7 awareness and collection campaigns at schools, colleges and residential areas. We currently working towards scaling this initiative in Mysuru and potentially a few more smaller towns in Karnataka.

## WAY FORWARD

As of February 2020, ENSYDE will handle the logistics as well as the awareness for the bE-Responsible program – thereby providing end-to-end solutions. Strong logistics and customer interface will support this, to ensure increased adoption. This format will be tested as we work towards sustainability of the program. Since handling the program independently, we have successfully completed 13 awareness campaigns in various areas throughout the city.

Our plan is to further increase and extend our reach in the city. Further, we are collaborating with a social/digital media experts to increase our viewership and usership.

# PRESCRIPTION FOR CHANGE

The program aims to create awareness to facilitate the management of unused and expired medicines. This waste stream is currently being dumped into landfills, contaminating our soil and water systems. This indiscriminate disposal is known to cause bioaccumulation of antibiotics in humans and animals leading to antibiotic resistance.

ENSYDE undertook a pilot of this initiative in Koramangala, Bangalore (Ward #151) for six months. We worked with apartments, open layouts, schools and colleges, creating awareness in various formats including door-to-door awareness, a play and newspaper inserts. Student interns from Jyoti Nivas College and Christ University played a major role in sensitizing the community.

## **IMPACTS**

## Sensitized 30,000+ citizens

Collected ~200 kg of unused/expired medicines and channelised it to a biomedical waste treatment facilityCitizens' keen interest to participate in the initiative as well as assured support from the local government (BBMP) are key motivators to take the program forward.

The pilot also allowed us to understand the costs for sustaining the program, the relevant stakeholders that are to be bought into the program, and the overall approach to raising the levels of awareness.

## **WAY FORWARD**

Based on the learnings from the pilot, ENSYDE plans to scale the initiative to 10 BBMP wards in Bangalore, with a minimum of 5 medicine drop-off points in each ward. In addition to ensuring safe take back and disposal of medicines, the program will also implement segregation of medical packaging such as aluminium, glass and plastic, for material recovery and recycling.

## **REGENERATREE - CREATING CARBON SINKS**

ENSYDE has initiated a program called REGENERATREE that focuses on creating micro forests in urban areas. Urban areas are seeing the most aggressive destruction of tree cover, becoming hotter and hotter every year. In order to make this program successful, not only do we plan to bring love for trees, increase the understanding of the role of trees in all aspects of our lives, and in maintaining the delicate balance in nature, the Regeneratree program is with a difference. Regeneratree was initiated by a student-volunteer, Diya Jagannath, with the intent of stimulating Bangalore youth to climate action.

## **IMPACTS**

ENSYDE has facilitated the planting of 2000 trees in Bangalore with a survival rate of 95%. We have educated and sensitized over 2500 citizens on the value of trees. Most recently ENSYDE partnered with DCB Bank and Salesforce to plant close to 1500 trees.

#### **WAY FORWARD**

This year, we have an aggressive target of planting 10,000 trees. ENSYDE is using crowd -funding as an option to raise funds for our program. We are also working with other organisations to pilot urban greening and biodiversity conservation.

# PLANETEERS PROGRAM

ENSYDE's Experiential Environmental Education program aims to sensitize children towards issues of water, energy and waste. This is achieved through improvements at home and their communities. ENSYDE does project-based learning program where children are required to research the issue, conduct surveys & data analysis, create & implement awareness campaigns around their solutions. Projects implemented by the students range from solarizing common areas in the school, to creating kitchen gardens; to educating residents about grey water recycling etc. All these allow the students to be environmentally, ethically, and scientifically sensitised.

The program has been tried and tested. The plan is to get the school children implement several more meaningful and impactful projects going forward in energy, water and waste management. We have a well-oiled module that is constantly being improved to ensure that the school children become true changemakers and citizens for the environment.

In 2019 Planeteers program was re-initiated in two schools. We have successfully conducted this program over the last 3 years at Samved in JP Nagar and Lawrence School in HSR Layout. With over 10 projects implemented, the initiative is slated to grow in the coming years.

The Planeteers initiative was also carried out in other schools through shorter high impact programs for sets of students. The students at Ebenezer International School, Vivero International Pre-School and Oakridge were sensitized through games, videos, quizzes, storytelling, and debates to issues related to climate change, waste segregation and upcycling.

Corporate awareness as part of our Planeteers Initiative took off through our activities at VMWare. Employees were given an overview of climate change weaving this issue through topics related to water savings, reducing the use of chemical detergents and enhancing green cover. The employees were given sample aerators to be installed in their homes, and organic detergents for their washing machines.

## **IMPACTS**

Sensitized over 5000 students and employees and helped them implement environmental solutions at community and school level. Reached out to over 1000 citizens through social media.
